THE VARIABLE SCHEDULE

GRADE PLACEMENT

HONOR ROLL

Honor roll will be calculated on the day that report cards are printed. No changes will be made to the published list after that date. Any student who has an incomplete at that time will not be added to the honor roll. Students must have *six* 1-credit classes and a minimum GPA of 3.25 or higher, to be eligible.

VALEDICTORIAN AND SALUTATORIAN DESIGNATION

Valedictorian and Salutatorian will be determined by overall GPA. Grades from advanced placement courses, college credit courses and courses currently designated as most rigorous will be factored into the GPA using a 5.0 grading scale and calculated into the overall determination. If two or more students are found to be of equal standing, early curriculum selections in the honors program will be factored in on a 5.0 grading scale.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

This organization recognizes student's excellence in scholarship, character, leadership, and service. Each member is required to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.5 or higher as well as meet community service requirements. Students may be asked to participate during sophomore, junior, and/or senior year. All initial invitations go out just before winter break, with inductions taking place sometime in February. All active senior members are honored at graduation with the wearing of special insignia, including cords and sash.

CLASS CHANGES AND WITHDRAWAL PROCEDURES

Class changes will only be made based on the following criteria; incorrect placement, student has already completed course, incomplete schedule, *or* has not met prerequisite. *Class changes may be made the first five days of each semester only.* After the fifth day, any class changes or drops will result in a grade of WF and be factored into your GPA. Any class added will be given no credit.

EARLY COMPLETION

If you are considering early completion of graduation requirements from Wood River High School, you must meet with your counselor for an application and deadline dates.

CORRESPONDENCE COURSES & INDEPENDENT STUDIES

Credits may be transferred in from approved & accredited independent study or online courses. You must also complete a contract of participation with a counselor before attempting one of these course options.

* Any correspondence or on-line courses taken for graduation requirements must be completed by the end of *second semester of their senior year*, in order to count toward graduation status.

RELEASE TIME (The student may be released to an organization for activities during the school day, between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.)

- * No credit will be awarded by WRHS for release time.
- * Students are still enrolled at WRHS.

A student applying for release time must present all of the following to a WRHS administrator:

- * Transcript showing a minimum GPA of 2.5
- * A “graduation status report”, signed by the student’s counselor.
- * Name of the organization the student will report to during school hours.
- * Name, address, telephone and e-mail of contact person at

- the organization.
- * Statement by the organization's contact person explaining why the student's activities with the organization must occur during school hours.
 - * Permission for release and liability waiver signed by parent/guardian and by the student.

Release time application forms are available in the guidance office.

WORK BASED LEARNING

1 ELECTIVE CREDIT for every eleven (11) hours per week.

PREREQUISITE: Must have proof of employment (current paystub) & approval from an administrator.

Our school believes in work related experiences. To earn one elective credit (1st or 7th period Work Based Learning), a student must complete a minimum of 11 hours per week (totaling 200 hours/semester). Students must have current proof of employment by the drop date or they will be dropped from WBL and be enrolled in another class, must remain employed for the whole semester and must provide monthly paystubs. Students must have a valid driver's license and registration to participate in this course. This class will be graded as a pass/fail class.

BOOK ROOM POLICIES

Student ID is required to check out books.

Books are checked out at registration to begin the year and at the beginning of each semester. At the end of each semester all books must be renewed or checked-in. Each student will complete a book condition agreement form at registration.

Students failing to check-in their text books will be subject to 10 cents per day late fee not to exceed the replacement cost of the text book.

If a student misplaces or loses a book they will be charged the replacement cost of the book. They can check out another book provided there are additional copies in the Book Room.

Books that are returned damaged will be assessed a fine based on a percentage of usability or the replacement cost of the text book.

Students will be required to keep ALL books covered throughout the semester with covers that will be supplied by the book room.

Books are the student's responsibility, and if they are lost due to leaving them in a classroom, the teacher is not responsible.

LIBRARY USE

Library hours are 8:00 to 4:30 daily. The library is available to teachers, students, and entire classes. Scheduled classes have priority. Walk-in students are restricted to space available with a library pass from their teacher. Students must sign in at the desk and have a library pass from their teacher to verify their visit. Students without a pass will be sent back to class.

Students must be respectful of those working around them.

Students may check out books for two weeks. Late fees are 25 cents per school day with a maximum of \$10.00 per book. Once student accounts are in arrears with late fines or late books, check out will be at the discretion of the librarian. Students are financially responsible for all borrowed library material.

VISITORS

All visitors must check in at the office and wear a visitor pass at all times while visiting Wood River High School. Students wishing to bring a visitor to the high school must get written approval 24 hours in advance from each of their teachers and administration. Forms will be available at the main office. **No visitors will be permitted during finals, the week before and following winter and spring breaks, and/or during the first and last weeks of the school year.**

COMPUTER USE POLICY / ACCEPTABLE USE AGREEMENT

In order for a student to use a computer on school premises a valid Acceptable Use Agreement (AUA) must be signed by both the student and parent and be kept on file in the main computer Lab. Failure to follow the rules on the AUA will be cause for loss of computer privileges, discipline, suspension and /or expulsion. Infractions that include unauthorized entry or altering of the District,

School, or Student Data Base may be cause for referral to law enforcement for prosecution under the Computer Crimes Statutes of the State of Idaho and referral to the Board for Expulsion.

State Statute 18-2202. Computer Crime

- (1) Any person who knowingly accesses, attempts to access or uses, or attempts to use any computer, computer system, computer network, or any part thereof for the purpose of: devising or executing any scheme or artifice to defraud; obtaining money, property, or services by means of false or fraudulent pretenses, representations, or promises; or committing theft, commits computer crime.
- (2) Any person who knowingly and without authorization alters, damages, or destroys any computer, computer system, or computer network described in section 18-2201 of Idaho Code, or any computer software, program, documentation, or data contained in such computer, computer system, or computer network commits computer crime.
- (3) Any person who knowingly and without authorization uses, accessed, or attempts to access any computer, computer system, or computer network described in section 18-2201 of Idaho Code, or any computer software, program, documentation or data contained in such computer, computer system, or computer network, commits computer crime.
- (4) A violation of the provisions of subsections (1) or (2) of these sections shall be a felony.
A violation of the provisions of subsection (3) of these sections shall be a misdemeanor.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

I. General Statement

According to the Compulsory Attendance Law of the State of Idaho (Idaho Code 33-202)

The parent or guardian of any child resident in this state, who has attained the age of seven years, but not the age of sixteen years, shall cause the child to be instructed in subjects commonly and usually taught in the public schools in the state of Idaho.

In order for optimal learning to occur, school attendance and punctuality are important. All students are required to be in attendance at school at least ninety (90) percent of the time school is

in session during each semester. The Board may deny a promotion to the next grade or deny credit for a class to any student who is not in school at least ninety (90) percent of the days school is in session. (District policy 500.7) Missing class for any reason, including family convenience, shall be counted as an absence when the percentage of attendance and consequent eligibility for promotion or credit is being considered. Activity absences, which fall within policy guidelines, will not be counted in the percentage of attendance. Specific building procedures are outlined in the District Procedure Manual.

***A student missing ten consecutive days will be dropped from Wood River High School enrollment.** (District policy 500.2)

II. Student Absence: All students are encouraged to have his/her parent/guardian call the school the day they are absent. If the parent has not called to excuse the absence, the student must provide the school with a note the day they return. Absences must be cleared within 48 hours; after that time the student is considered truant.

Medical Excused Absences: If a student misses school for a medical appointment or under the care of a physician, they will need to bring a note to the school attendance secretary from the medical office stating that the student was under their care. Medically excused absences do not count towards the nine absences allowed per semester.

Excused Absences: *Students* will be excused from school when they are ill and when illness or a death in their family requires their absence. Any verification of absences by parents must be received within 48 hours after return to school. Only parents or legal guardians may excuse a student's absence. Students reaching the age of 18 may excuse their absences for illness and medical or legal appointments with written parental consent. Any medical excuses need to be turned in two weeks prior to the end of the semester. Make-up work will be given if the absence extends more than one day. After an accumulation of more than nine (9) absences during a semester, the student will appear before the Attendance Review Committee. Seniors and Juniors are allowed three college visit days per year. Students must complete a pre-excuse form available at the attendance office. The student must bring back a dated official document that has been signed by the college representative.

Pre-excused absences: Parents may request excused absences in advance for extended absences or important family events. Pre-excused absences may be applied for by filling out the required forms, getting the signatures of your parent, teachers and principal. **The student is responsible to have completed homework and class assignments upon return from approved trip. Upon your return you should be prepared to turn in your assignments, take tests or quizzes and take part in the daily activities of the class.** While teachers can extend due dates in extraordinary circumstances for larger projects, the intent of this procedure is to assist the student in staying current with their work and the progress of the class as a whole. **Pre-excused absences do count towards the students nine day total per semester. If you are absent ten consecutive days, student will be un-enrolled. (District policy 500.2)**

A student may not be excused to miss a class where an exam or quiz is being given. If a student missed class in order to avoid having to take a test or hand in assigned work that is due, will receive a zero (0) on the test or work.

Make-up work: Make-up work is required for all students. Credit for make-up work is not given for an unexcused absence.

The classroom teacher will provide the student or the parent/guardian who requests make-up work with:

1. A list of pages covered during the absence;
2. Information about assignments or special projects;
3. A copy of all handout materials given during the absence.

A student will be allowed two (2) days for each missed day of excused absence to make up school work, **not to exceed six days from the date of the absence.** The principal or classroom teacher may make exceptions to the policy in extreme cases.

Tardies: A student, who is not in the classroom when the tardy bell rings, and up to 5 minutes past the tardy bell, will be considered tardy. After 5 minutes a student is considered absent. Tardies are considered a disruption to the learning process. The following will be enforced: After the accumulation of three tardies, a Saturday School will be assigned. Additional Saturday School assignment will be assigned for every three tardies. **TARDIES ARE NOT EXCUSABLE.**

Truancy: Students who are absent without the knowledge and consent of parents or the school will be classified truant. This classification shall also apply to any students who fail to report to an assigned class within the school day or who leave school without checking out through the attendance secretary and authorization from his/her principal. The following rules apply:

1. No make-up work or credit will be given for days classified as truant.
2. Make-up work and credit will be granted for absences while a student is suspended from school.
3. Students attending under the Compulsory Attendance Law who accumulate excessive truancies may be referred to Status Offender Services of the Fifth Judicial District.
4. Students who are beyond the age for Compulsory Attendance and who accumulate excessive truancies may be suspended until they and their parents show cause for continued school attendance.

Administration of Truancy Policy:

1. First Truancy: A parent or guardian will be notified immediately after the first truancy and a conference with the student will be held informing the student of his/her rights and responsibilities by the assistant principal or designee. The juvenile officer may be notified at the assistant principal's discretion. Saturday School will be assigned.
2. Second Truancy: The student will serve Saturday School as determined by the assistant principal and a conference will be held between the parent/guardian, student and assistant principal. Status Offender Services of the 5th Judicial District will be notified if the student is under the age of 16.
3. Third Truancy: A third truancy will result in the student being subject to a hearing with either the Superintendent or the School Board. When it is determined that a student should be expelled for violation of the truancy policy, procedures shall be followed as outlined under Section 514.8 Suspension and Expulsion.

****In accordance with State Law (Idaho Code 33-206), whenever a student has repeatedly violated School District policies, a School District representative must notify in writing, the Prosecuting Attorney's office.***

Loss of Credit for Excessive Excused Absences: Students who accumulate more than nine absences in any class may lose credit for the course in question depending on the decision of the Attendance Review Committee. The student, parent/guardian will be notified by letter when their student reaches his/her sixth absence, ninth absence and when they exceed the limit they will receive a Loss of Credit notification. They will be asked to appear before the Attendance Review Committee at the end of the semester to briefly discuss the nature of the absences.

All documentation from doctors, etc. must be submitted before or during your appearance with the Attendance Review Committee.

Saturday School: Saturday School is a program where students must attend school on Saturday morning, from 8:00 am – 12:00 p.m. due to discipline problems in school. Saturday school is an alternative to suspension. Students will be expected to bring sufficient homework, complete school/community service and comply with Saturday School policies and expectations. Disciplinary actions leading to Saturday School can be, but are not limited to the following:

1. Truancy, tardies
2. Discipline referrals from teaching staff.
3. Severe or recurring problems (i.e., cheating, vandalism, disrespect, defiance, bad language, etc.)

Consequences for “no-shows” are as follows:

1st Offense: Warning that the student will be suspended (can be in-house) if they do not attend the next available Saturday school session. A letter will be mailed home to inform the parents/guardians.

2nd Offense: The student will be suspended (can be in-house) for one school day of the administrations choice. This suspension will take the place of the Saturday School session. A letter will be mailed home to inform the parents/guardians.

Closed Campus: Wood River High School campus is closed to all freshman and sophomore students. Once students arrive at school

they may not leave without the knowledge and consent of parent/guardian. Students are required to sign out through the Attendance Secretary. Students who violate this policy will be subject to disciplinary action.

Leaving School during the Day: Other than their lunch period, students must report to the Attendance Secretary to checkout when leaving school. Students will be asked to contact their parent/guardian for permission to leave for illness, appointments or family business. **Failure to properly checkout is considered a truancy.**

SCHOOL SPONSORED FIELD TRIPS

A parent/guardian permission slip, prepared by the teacher must be signed by the parent/guardian of each student who will be leaving school grounds on a field trip. The permission slip must be turned in prior to the field trip. Students are required to complete and turn in a Student Field Trip Form/Pre-excused form to the teacher prior to the field trip. **Students are responsible for missed homework and material. Upon returning from the field trip, students should be prepared to turn missed work in, take tests or quizzes and take part in the daily activities of class.** If a student has excessive absences or is failing a class he/she will not attend. School sponsored field trip absences do not count towards the nine absence totals allowed per semester.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The principal shall be responsible for the organization of all student activities. He shall provide adequate supervision, administer student finances and approve all student activities with the assistance of delegated members of the faculty. Elected Student Union Officials will decide how student body funds are expended with the assistance and guidance of assigned advisors and the approval of the principal. Student activities shall be regarded as a vital part of the total educational program and shall be used as a means of developing wholesome attitudes and good human relations, as well as knowledge and skills. No student activities shall be held on Sunday.

Advisors shall be present at all meetings or functions of any class or club. Hazing or other forms of initiation shall be prohibited. Only formal induction ceremonies for a club, class or student body activity will be allowed, and then only under the planning and supervision of

the sponsor and principal.

ID Card

All students will receive a student ID card. A temporary card will be issued for registration and students will receive their permanent card on picture day. Students are required to have these cards with them at all times while at school or school sponsored activities. ID cards are required for all textbook checkouts, library checkouts, lunchroom charges and dance admissions.

Student Activity Cards will be sold during fall registration. This card entitles a student to free admission to all home athletic events, music events, and, in most cases, discounts at away athletic events. Activity cards do not allow admission to District or State competitions. **To participate in any extracurricular activity governed by IHSA, the purchase of an activity card is required.**

Loss of ID cards or activity cards should be reported to the office. New cards will be issued upon the payment of \$5.00. Forgery, falsification or misrepresentation of ID/Activity cards may result in loss of activity card/privileges.

Athletics/Activities

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Participation in any extracurricular activity is a privilege, not a right. Student leaders, which include Student Union Officers, Class Representatives, Cheerleaders, and those students participating in extracurricular activity, are expected to set a positive example for the rest of the student body. If these students break any of the rules as stipulated in the Blaine County School District code of conduct whether on or off school property, and whether or not involved in a school-sponsored activity, there will be an additional penalty involved.

All students participating in extracurricular activities must purchase a student activity card.

The purpose and objectives of Wood River High School's Athletic Department and its interscholastic athletic program are the development and maintenance of individual health and vigor, perfection of playing skills, enjoyment of competitive play, development of sportsmanship and citizenship, and contribution to school and community spirit and morale.

Those students who participate in the interscholastic athletic program commit themselves to the following personal goals: a primary focus on academic development and attendance; the presentation of a positive image through dress and grooming; avoidance of any action which would bring embarrassment or disrepute to themselves or their team; development of desirable personal health standards (which includes the avoidance of tobacco of any kind, alcoholic beverages, and illegal drugs and substances); development of athletic skills; and the growth of a competitive philosophy which includes sportsmanship and a consistent awareness of school and community pride.

The players on each team will be governed, at the minimum, by the following Athletic Department rules. Each head coach may establish additional, individual sports rules for his/her team such as curfew on overnight stays, attendance at practice sessions, personal conduct, and personal appearance.

These rules are in effect year-round, when school is in or out of session including Summer, Holidays, Spring Breaks, weekends and legal holidays.

I. CONDUCT/BEHAVIOR

A. INAPPROPRIATE CONDUCT

As stated in Paragraph Two, athletes are expected to maintain a level of conduct which does not discredit themselves or their teams. Violations of this standard would include, but are not limited to, Insubordination, Lying to School Officials, Cheating/Plagiarism, Gang-Related Activities, Inappropriate Physical Conduct, Vandalism, and Theft. The minimum penalty for a first offense of behavior which is inappropriate for or unbecoming an athlete is a one contest suspension. The penalty for first offenses which are deemed severe and for succeeding infractions shall be determined by the Athletic Director, with the minimum penalty for a second offense being a one week (minimum one contest) suspension.

B. DANGEROUS/CRIMINAL BEHAVIOR

This would include, but is not limited to, Fighting, the Sounding of False Fire Alarms, the Possession of Dangerous Materials or Weapons, and any criminal activity. The penalty for dangerous/criminal behavior will be assessed according to the guidelines listed in V. B.

C. HAZING

Athletes at Wood River High School commit to supporting, encouraging, and mentoring each other in their efforts to achieve individual and team goals. Engaging in or encouraging hazing is strictly prohibited. Hazing occurs when any person knowingly requires the performance of any act by a student, or the acquiescence to any act performed by or upon a student, for the purpose of induction into, admission into, initiation into, affiliation with, or maintaining membership in, any group, organization, society, club or team, or any action or statement which harasses, threatens, humiliates, or intimidates another student.

Athletes who engage in any form of hazing, or who do not report acts of hazing which they witness, will be subject to one or more of the following disciplinary actions: expulsion, suspension from school, loss of privilege; athletic suspension

according to the guidelines listed in V; and possible referral to appropriate law enforcement agencies.

II. UNEXCUSED ABSENCE AT SCHEDULED ATHLETIC COMPETITIONS

Unexcused absence from scheduled athletic competitions shall be prearranged and approved by the particular coach.

Extenuating circumstances will be reviewed by the Athletic Director. The penalty for a first offense may include suspension from one athletic contest. For any succeeding offense during that season, the penalty will be expulsion from the team for the remainder of the season.

III. PARTICIPATION ON DAYS OF CLASS ABSENCE

An athlete's participation in athletic practices or contests on days of partial or complete absence from school must be cleared through the Athletic Director's office. A student-athlete will not be cleared to participate if he or she has an absence of more than one academic period for something other than a nondiscretionary (i.e. court, wake, funeral) or school-related (i.e. field trip, performance) event. If the absence is due to a doctors' appointment or illness, the student-athlete is required to provide the Athletic Director with a note of clearance from the doctor before the end of the school day.

According to the Blaine County School Code, if a student is serving an out-of-school suspension or in-school suspension, he/she may not attend any school function for any reason. This applies to athletic contests (home and away) as well as practices. A student may participate in a competitive event on the day following a suspension. But, many coaches have a team policy that may prohibit an athlete from participating in an athletic competition after missing practice.

In regard to Saturday School, athletes who are assigned Saturday School during the season must fulfill these obligations as scheduled. No participation of any kind (i.e. registration, weigh-ins, warm-ups, and practice) is allowed on a

Saturday prior to the completion of a scheduled Saturday School obligation. A student may participate in a contest or practice once all obligations have been fulfilled.

IV. TRAVEL

A. TRANSPORTATION:

All athletes shall travel to and from athletic events held outside of the Wood River Valley using school-sponsored transportation. The Wood River Valley is defined as North of the blinking light located at the intersection of Highway 75 and Highway 20 and South of Galena Summit. Athletes may return from athletic events with a parent and or legal guardian with the permission of the particular coach. A parent and or legal guardian must be physically present to sign the responsibility of student athlete away from the coach. A parent and or legal guardian may transport only their child to and from events outside of the Wood River Valley. Extenuating circumstances will be handled by the Athletic Director. Parents should contact the Athletic Director and Head Coach well in advance of the event if there are any questions. If permission is granted by the Head Coach, students traveling within the Wood River Valley may provide their own transportation.

B. DRESS CODE:

All students will adhere to Wood River High School Dress Code while attending and traveling to and from all school sponsored events. Changing clothes on the bus is generally prohibited but extenuating circumstances such as lack of facilities may cause the need to change clothes on the bus. Permission to change clothes on the bus will be based on approval and discretion of the Head Coach and Bus Driver.

C. OVERNIGHT STAYS:

All students will be held to the same code of conduct as explained in this document and Wood River High School student manual while attending extracurricular functions that require overnight stays. Students of the opposite gender are

not allowed to be in the same room at the same time without coach supervision. Violations of any of these rules may result in a student's immediate suspension. Parents or legal guardians may be asked to travel to the event at their own expense to assume responsibility of the student.

V. SMOKING, CHEWING TOBACCO, ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, ILLEGAL DRUGS, CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES, AND/OR PARAPHERNALIA.

The possession or use of tobacco of any kind, alcoholic beverages, and/or the possession or use of illegal drugs or controlled substances or paraphernalia shall not be permitted for any athlete. This prohibition includes the sale, purchase, possession, consumption, distribution, and/or participation in a plan to sell, purchase, possess, consume, and/or distribute alcoholic beverages and/or illegal drugs or controlled substances, and/or paraphernalia, and/or any of the above mentioned items.

Penalty for Violations:

1. First Offense while attending Grades 9-12: Suspension from participation in any school sponsored extracurricular activity for a period of 28 consecutive school calendar days but no more than the remainder of a sport season. School calendar days are defined as Monday through Saturday beginning the first day of practice and/or school (whichever is earlier) and ending the last day of Spring Competition or last day of school (whichever is earlier). Suspensions will carry over to the following activity season when students are involved in yearlong activities or participating in multiple activities.

As an alternative, student suspension will be reduced by seven consecutive school calendar days **if the parent or legal guardian and student agree, the student must fully attend and participate in a drug and alcohol assessment administered by a certified drug and alcohol agency which may include a urinalysis.** Student and parent or legal guardian must follow all recommendations of the agency for education and/or treatment. Student and parent or legal guardian must further agree to share with the school the recommendations of the agency and completion of any education or treatment. Suspensions will carry over to the following activity season when students are involved in yearlong activities or participating in multiple activities.

If the parent or legal guardian agrees to fully attend and fully participate in the drug and alcohol assessment/treatment with their student, the suspension will be further reduced by seven consecutive calendar days. If all the above obligations have been met by the student and parent or legal guardian, the student will be suspended from participation in practice for a period of five (5) consecutive school calendar days and suspended from competition for a period of ten (10) consecutive school calendar days. Suspensions will carry over to the following activity season when students are involved in yearlong activities or participating in multiple activities.

Second Offense while attending Grades 9-12: The student will not be allowed to participate in student activities, and/or student body office for the remainder of the school year. **If the student and parent or legal guardians agree to participate in the alternative drug or alcohol treatment procedures, the suspension will be reduced to 28 consecutive school calendar days.** Suspensions will carry over to the following activity season when students are involved in yearlong activities or participating in multiple activities.

Succeeding Infractions past Second Offense while attending Grades 9-12: The penalty for each succeeding infraction of this rule shall be determined by the Athletic Director and Wood River High School Administration. Penalties may result in expulsion of up to 365 consecutive school calendar days from participation in activities. Suspensions will carry over to the following activity season when students are involved in yearlong activities or participating in multiple activities.

VI. EQUIPMENT AND/OR UNIFORMS

Unauthorized possession of equipment and/or uniforms is prohibited. Students in possession of unauthorized equipment or uniforms must return items immediately to the Equipment Manager. Students will be assessed a late fee of \$25.00 for non-returned uniform items or equipment returns. The return deadline for returning school issued equipment and/or uniform will be determined by the return date set by coaching staff or two weeks upon completion of the activity season whichever is earlier. Students will be billed for all unreturned items at replacement cost as well as a late fee and administrative fee. Students who are not cleared at the end of a season will not be allowed to participate in another sport until their equipment obligations have been satisfied. Students risk not receiving

their diplomas until all monies owed to Wood River High School have been received by Wood River High School.

VII. ELIGIBILITY

1. Initial Eligibility: The Idaho High School Activities Association (IHSAA) requires students involved in any IHSAA sponsored activity to meet the following requirements:
 - a. Current Physical Examination on file at Wood River High School.
 - i. All incoming Freshman must take a physical after May 1 of the upcoming Freshman year.
 - ii. Wood River High School physical examinations expire after two years.
 - iii. Current 8th grade physicals are eligible for current eighth students attending high school cheerleading tryouts but must adhere to rule “i” above before the first official Wood River High School practice.
 - b. Age - A student becomes ineligible for athletics upon completion of the sport season in which he/she turns 20 years of age.
 - c. Numbers of semesters of eligibility – students may only participate in IHSAA activities for four semesters of high school after initial 9th grade enrollment. Students may only participate in four seasons of an individual activity. See IHSAA Rules and Regulations rule 8-8 for further details.
 - d. Attendance the previous semester – students must be a “Full Time Student” the previous semester prior to the start of an activity season. A Full-Time student is a student enrolled in at least three classes (2011 only). Beginning in the 2012 school year,

students involved in activities must be enrolled in at least five classes to be considered a Full Time Student.

- e. Number of subjects passed previous semester – Students enrolled in three classes in Spring 2011 must pass all three classes to be eligible to participate in IHSAA activities (2011 only). Students must pass at least 4 out of the 5 enrolled classes, or 5 out of 6 enrolled classes or 6 out of 7 enrolled classes. See IHSAA Rules and Regulations rule 8-1. An incomplete or conditional grade received at the end of a semester counts as a failure until the deficiency is removed. Withdraw Non-Credit or Withdraw fail counts as a failure.
 - f. The Idaho High School Activities Association requires students involved in IHSAA activities with a Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) less than 2.0 enrolled in an Academic Improvement Plan. Wood River High School defines their Academic Improvement Plans as being enrolled in a PASS Class. Students with a Cumulative GPA less than 2.0 must be enrolled in a PASS class until their cumulative grade point average is 2.0 or higher.
 - g. Transfer students - permission to compete is required and must be received from IHSAA before student is allowed to participate in IHSAA sponsored competitions. See IHSAA Rules and Regulations rules 8-9 and 8-14 for further details.
2. Weekly Eligibility: Students involved in IHSAA activities will be subject to weekly grade checks during the activity season. A report will be

delivered to the Varsity Head Coach of each activity each week listing students failing at least one class. Coaches will notify each student athlete about each of his/her failing classes by presenting the student with a form showing the student's name, description of failing class, class period and current grade. On rare occasions, progress reports may list a student as failing a class when the student is passing a class. Students will have an opportunity to clarify questionable failing grades by returning a dated and signed signature form from a teacher of a failing class stating the current passing grade. Students cannot miss any part of a failing class to attend an extracurricular event.

VII. PARTICIPATION ON DAYS OF SCHOOL ABSENCE

An athlete's participation in athletic practices or contests on days of partial or complete absence from school must be cleared through the Athletic Director's office. A student-athlete may not participate in practice or competitive events if he or she has an absence of more than one academic period for something other than a nondiscretionary (i.e. court, wake, funeral) or school-related (i.e. field trip, performance) event. If the absence is due to a doctors' appointment or illness, the student-athlete is required to provide the Athletic Director with a note of clearance from the doctor before the end of the school day.

VIII. ACTIVITY CARDS

All students participating in the following Idaho High School Activity Association (IHSAA) must purchase a Wood River High School (WRHS) Activity Card. IHSAA sanctioned or sponsored activities include Choir, Band, Debate, Drama, Orchestra, Cheerleading, Football, Cross Country, Volleyball, Soccer, Basketball, Wrestling, Baseball, Softball, Golf, Tennis and Track. Students enrolled in one semester of Speech to satisfy graduation requirements will not be required to

purchase an activity card. Students enrolled in additional Speech classes to satisfy elective credits must purchase a Wood River High School Activity Card. Students must pay in full the WRHS Activity Card fee before issuance. It is strongly suggested students that are required to purchase a WRHS Activity Card purchase the activity card at the beginning of the school year to take full advantage of attending all WRHS regular season athletic events free of charge.

IX. PHYSICAL EDUCATION CREDIT

Wood River High School requires four Physical Education (PE) class credits as a graduation requirement. A student athlete may satisfy a maximum of two of the required four PE credits by participating in IHSAA sporting activities that include Cheerleading, Football, Cross Country, Soccer, Volleyball, Basketball, Wrestling, Baseball, Softball, Golf, Tennis and Track. One-half Physical Education credit will be issued after the completion of each sport season if the student meets the following minimum criteria:

- 1) Completes the sport season in good standing and receives a Freshman, Junior Varsity or Varsity Certificate.
- 2) Attends 90% of scheduled events (including scheduled practices and formal competitions).

X. INSURANCE

Wood River High School requires each student athlete be covered by accident insurance. Your signature on the athletic participation form indicates that, along with your permission for your son or daughter to participate, you accept the responsibility of maintaining an insurance program to cover him or her in the event of injury. Independent company insurance information is available at Wood River High School. Please contact school Athletic Director for more information.

DANCES

Students must have a current ID card. Each student may sponsor one guest per event. Any student bringing a guest must complete and turn in a guest pass 24 hours prior to an event. The guest pass slip and guest ID must be presented at the door. A guest is defined as High School age through age 20. All Wood River High School policies will be enforced including dress code.

LOCKERS

For the necessary protection of personal belongings and books it is recommended that each student of WRHS have a locker. All students participating in physical education classes, as well as athletics, must have a lock, provided by WRHS, for their gym locker. If the lock, issued by WRHS, is not returned a \$5.00 fee will be charged to the student. It is important to note that school officials also reserve the right to inspect any locker on the premises when it is deemed necessary. Additionally, the school will not assume the responsibility for articles that are lost or stolen from lockers or any other area or room within the school building.

DRESS CODE

The dress code policy applies to all school activities and events. WRHS students will adhere to the following clothing policy in order to help

- Provide a safe and orderly school environment.
- Create and support an appropriate work place/learning environment.
- Support the school curriculum, which includes health and hygiene, character and career education.
- Promote pride in personal appearance and in the school.
 1. Students must be clean and groomed.
 2. Shoes must be worn.
 3. Clothes will be reasonably loose fitting (no sagging), as opposed to skin-tight, with the pants, skirts, shorts, shirts and tops covering the waist when standing or sitting and nothing considered undergarments will show. Skirts, dresses and shorts will be fingertip length or longer when standing upright.

4. Garments that expose the midriff, cleavage, buttocks or back will not be worn to school. (No spaghetti straps or strapless garments)
5. Any clothing, jewelry, accessory, or other personal item shall be free of chains, spikes or other potentially dangerous objects.
6. Any clothing, jewelry, accessory, or other personal item shall be free of writing, pictures or any other insignia that
 - Is vulgar, profane, or sexually suggestive
 - Is intended to intimidate or express prejudice and discrimination against people based on race, ethnicity, gender, religion, national origin, or sexual orientation.
 - Advocates or encourages illegal activity including any gang affiliation or use of drugs, alcohol or tobacco.
7. Caps, headbands, hats, or other types of headwear will not be worn inside the building, from the time of entry in the morning until the end of the school day (except for instructional, safety, religious or medical reasons)
8. Sunglasses may not be worn inside the school building (except for instructional, safety, religious or medical reasons)
9. No gang related attire such as rags, bandanas, jackets, shirts, colors, numbers, initials, etc. is permitted.

** Decisions regarding the appropriateness of clothing, footwear and accessories will be made by the Principal and/or their appointed designee. The administration reserves the right to grant medical exceptions. **Items deemed inappropriate will be brought to the student and the parent's attention for corrective action.**

WRHS Clothing Policy Enforcement

1st Offense: Student will be asked to change or wear clothing provided by the school that complies with the policy. Students must return school clothing to the Attendance Secretary at the end of the day. If not returned in same condition, the student will be charged a replacement fee.

2nd Offense: Student will be expected to comply with policy and Saturday school will be assigned.

3rd Offense: Student will be suspended for 1 day.

Written notification will be sent home following each offense.

LOST AND FOUND

Items found in the building or on the grounds should be turned into room A101. Students searching for lost articles should inquire in room A101. All unclaimed items will be donated to charity.

STUDENT CONDUCT

Development of good discipline is one of the most important goals of education. Discipline is the development of self-control, character and proper consideration for other people. Understanding the purpose of discipline in school facilitates the development of positive attitudes and assists the student in becoming a better person.

Unfortunately, some students choose not to follow the rules and those students will be dealt with as described on the following pages. Extraordinary circumstances involved in a breach of the following rules may be handled at the principal's discretion.

Disciplinary violations, which will result in disciplinary actions:

1. Verbal, non-verbal or physical abuse of a school official;
2. Verbal, non-verbal or physical abuse of other students (hazing, fighting, cyber bullying, etc.);
3. Possession of firearms, weapons, or dangerous playthings;
4. Violation of school transportation policy;
5. Refusal of students to identify themselves to school personnel upon request;
6. Violation of school parking and safe driving regulations;
7. Theft or unauthorized entry into school premises, lockers or vehicles on school premises;
8. Use of tobacco, alcohol, OTC, prescription or illegal drugs on school grounds;
9. Vandalizing school property;
10. Cheating or plagiarism;
11. Violation of attendance policy, including truancy;
12. Vulgarity or profanity/written or spoken
13. Possession of obscene material;
14. Willful disobedience;

15. Disruptive conduct;
16. The use of, the sale of, the distribution of, the possession of, or being under the influence of narcotics, dangerous drugs or controlled substances, or alcoholic beverages;
17. The principals of individual schools may add reasonable rules for the operation of the school.
18. Refusal of student to follow the directives of school personnel.

Use of/or Possession of Alcohol, Illegal Drugs, Tobacco or Drug Paraphernalia

Student use of, or possession of alcohol or other illegal substances will not be permitted on or off school property. This applies not only during school hours, but during any school sponsored activity, whether on or off school property, and applies to student vehicles as well. As required by law, students will receive instruction in health and physical fitness, which will include instruction on the effects of alcohol, stimulants, narcotics, and tobacco on the human system. In an effort to eliminate drugs from Wood River High School, a drug-sniffing dog will visit the school and parking lot periodically throughout the school year.

If there is reasonable suspicion to believe that a student is either under the influence or in possession of an illegal substance, he/she will be required to take a drug test provided at no cost, by the school administration. Refusal to be tested will result in immediate enforcement of the Blaine County School District Drug & Alcohol Policy.

Use of, or possession of alcohol, illegal drugs, tobacco, or paraphernalia will result in the following:

1st Offense: The parent or guardian will be notified as well as local law enforcement agencies. Immediate suspension with a recommendation for a thirty-day suspension to the Board of Trustees or their designees. The expulsion/suspension will be reduced in accordance with district policy and procedure if the student and parents/guardians choose as an alternative, a drug and alcohol assessment, including a urinalysis, and to follow the recommendations of the agency for education and or

treatment. If the students and parents/guardians elect this option, the suspension will be reduced by fifteen (15) days. If the parent/guardian agrees to attend and participate in the drug and alcohol assessment/ treatment with their student, the suspension will be further reduced by five (5) more days. The student will be suspended from school for five (5) days during which he/she will do community service with a recognized agency under their supervision during school hours. When the student returns to school, he/she may be placed on a behavioral contract.

2nd Offense: The parent/guardian will be notified as well as local law enforcement agencies. The student will be suspended with a recommendation to the Board of Trustees for an expulsion for one full calendar year. Expulsion may be modified to a minimum of one trimester if the student and parent/guardian agree to ten (10) days of community service and a Drug and Alcohol Assessment with a urinalysis and to follow the recommendations of the agency and completion of any education or treatment. If there are less than three weeks remaining in a trimester, the student may, on the approval of the school board, be allowed to finish the trimester's work and tests at home and serve the expulsion in the following trimester. In no instance will a student be allowed to participate in commencement exercises until the expulsion has been served. Failure to follow the terms of the agreement will result in the institution of the original suspension. Upon returning to the school, the student will be on a strict behavioral contract.

3rd Offense: The student will be suspended with a recommendation to the Board of Trustees for an expulsion for one school year

Manufacture, sale or distribution of tobacco, alcohol, or any illegal inhalant or controlled mood-altering chemical or abused chemical: Grade Levels K-12

1st Offense: The parent or guardian will be notified, as well as

local law enforcement agencies. The student shall immediately be suspended from school attendance with a recommendation to the Board of Trustees for expulsion of one (1) full calendar year. Police will be notified.

Theft/Vandalism

Though it is assumed that high school students should be honest and respectful of other's property, some are not. Consequently, students involved in stealing or damaging school property will be penalized as follows:

- 1st Offense: Three-day suspension and restitution.
- 2nd Offense: Five-day suspension and restitution.
- 3rd Offense: Suspension with recommendation to the Board of Trustees for expulsion.

Harassment, Bullying, Threats & Intimidation

Any student causing, attempting to cause or threatening to cause physical injury to another person on school property, or during a school sponsored activity, may be suspended and/or recommended for expulsion. Cyber bullying which involves any individual or group using computer and or communication technology to engage in deliberate, repeated, and hostile behavior that is intended to harm others may be subject to disciplinary action. (District Policy 415.4, 426.4)

Sexual Harassment

It is the policy of the Blaine County School District to maintain learning and working environments that are free from sexual harassment. The School District prohibits any form of sexual harassment. It shall be a violation of this policy for any student to harass a student or school personnel through conduct or communication of a sexual nature. The School District will act to investigate all complaints, formal or informal, verbal or written, of sexual harassment, and to discipline or take appropriate action against any student who is found to have violated this policy. See Blaine County School District policy section 511.5.

Fighting

Fighting will not be tolerated at Wood River High School in any form. Students who participate in a fight will be suspended for three to five days. Multiple fighting offenses will result in a hearing before

the Superintendent or the School Board.

Public Displays of Affection

Students are expected to refrain from unacceptable public displays of affection in school, on school grounds, or at any district sponsored event. Unacceptable public displays of affection include, but are not limited to, any prolonged embracing and/or kissing, or any touching of a sexual nature.

Unacceptable public displays of affection in school are in poor taste, disruptive to the educational environment and may violate Sexual Harassments Laws. Students who violate this policy will be subject to disciplinary action.

Weapons

Carrying or possessing a weapon on school property is unlawful.

Many instruments could be considered weapons such as, but not limited to: guns, knives of all types, spikes of any type, lead pipes, bats, chains, chuck-sticks, throwing stars, darts, metal knuckles, black-jacks and explosives. Students are forbidden to knowingly and/or voluntarily possess, handle, transmit or use any instrument that could be used as a weapon of any kind. Possession, use or attempt to use anything as a weapon may result in recommended expulsion.

Cell Phones, IPOD's, Laptops and electronic devices

Wood River High School is an institution of learning. No student will be permitted to disrupt the learning process in any way. Cell phone use during class time is considered a disruption to the learning process; therefore, students may not use cell phones at WRHS during any school classroom hours. Cell phones may not be used in the classroom or in the building at anytime other than before school, during lunch, after school or at passing times. In emergencies, a student may make a phone call from the attendance office. Students who violate this policy will be subject to disciplinary action.

IPOD's, MP3 players, and/or other audio or visual devices may not be used in the classroom without the teacher's permission. Electronic devices containing inappropriate material may be confiscated and student may be subject to disciplinary and/or legal action.

Cheating / Plagiarism

Students who are caught cheating/plagiarizing on assignments or tests will receive a zero on that assignment or test and will be assigned to Saturday School. The second offense of cheating or plagiarism will result in loss of credit. Examples of cheating/plagiarism include, but are not limited to:

Copying from others during an examination, communicating exam answers with other students during an examination, offering another person's work as one's own, in whole or in part, taking an examination for another student or having someone take an examination for oneself, sharing answers for a take-home examination or assignment unless specifically authorized by the instructor, tampering with an examination after it has been corrected, then returning it for more credit, using unauthorized materials, prepared answers, written notes, or concealed or unauthorized information during an examination, allowing others to do the research and/or writing of an assignment (including use of the services of a commercial academic paper company), and using copied internet based materials. (District Policy 507.9)

Forgeries

Forgery includes someone calling in posing as their guardian or forging another person's signature and forgery of official documents. Students who violate this policy will be subject to disciplinary action.

SEARCH AND SEIZURE

A student has the right to privacy of his/her person. There must be reasonable cause to believe that prohibited articles are contained on school property before school officials undertake a search. In the event of a search and seizure:

1. The search of school property assigned to the student (locker, desk, etc.) shall be undertaken with the student and competent witnesses being present except under extreme circumstances.
2. Illegal items that present a reasonable threat to the safety and security of others may be taken into custody by school authorities.

WITHDRAWAL FROM SCHOOL

If it becomes necessary for a student to withdraw from school, a checkout sheet from the guidance office must be obtained. The student is expected to return all books, obtain all signatures, fee amounts and grades. The checkout sheet will be presented to the guidance office for clearance. Current grade at time of withdrawal will appear on your transcript.

VEHICLES

Students are expected to operate vehicles in a safe and prudent manner. Unnecessary and reckless driving on or near school property may result in the denial of student's driving privilege. School driveways are not provided for pleasure driving or as visiting areas. After driving the vehicle onto the school grounds, the student will park the vehicle until classes have been completed. Students are not to be in or on their parked vehicles during lunchtime or during their regular class time. Students are expected to observe all traffic laws and the traffic flow in the parking lot.

1. The school will assume no responsibility for the security of any vehicle or any vehicle-related incident for vehicles while parked on or off the school campus.
2. The school reserves the right to remove vehicles, at the student's expense, or suspend the driver's parking privilege of cars that are parked in restricted areas. Restricted areas will be identified with appropriate markings. Vehicles should not be moved or occupied by students during any part of the school day.

PARKING PERMITS

Any student who possesses a legal driver's license, current proof of insurance and would like to drive their car to school may do so by obtaining a parking permit during or after registration at the office on a space available basis. The permit costs \$20.00. **All other school fees must be paid when due throughout the year to keep your parking permit.** If the student has two parking or driving violations, the car may be towed at the owner's expense after appropriate notification or the permit may be suspended. Any student automobiles parked on school grounds including WRHS SCHS and Community Campus will be subject to the following consequences.

Parking violation consequences (adopted by the Student Council, Fall 2002):

First Offense: Warning
Second Offense: \$20.00 fine
Third Offense: Vehicle will be towed

Student parking violations in visitor parking area:

First Offense: \$20.00 fine
Second Offense Vehicle will be towed

Student parking violation in handicapped area:

First Offense: Vehicle will be towed

Permits may be revoked due to speeding or reckless driving at the discretion of the administration or security officer.

A parking permit allows you to park on school property but does not exempt you from any hazardous driving or illegal parking violations on campus.
